PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

BUTTERFLIES ARE FREE, BUT GENEALOGY WILL COST YOU

n my opinion, most genealogical Lecords should be public records. The records kept by governments were collected on behalf of the people those governments represent. Indeed. history. including genealogical information, is the property of the human race. The first time I ran into a contrary view was when I discovered my genealogical information for sale on a Family Tree Maker CD. I know many of our members had the same unpleasant experience! Then it got worse: the same data was published about 59 more times on new CDs, but without the notes from my original GED file! Apart from the insult, the cost was far too high compared with the quality of the data. But I have come to understand that it costs money to provide information.

Today, most major vendors provide an acceptable level of quality at a reasonable price, or they soon disappear. Overall, the content is better, and it is easier to use. But one problem still bothers me. Why are some of the large information services only accessible from libraries? I'm thinking here of ProQuest, the vendor of the Heritage Quest service. Questing Heirs would like to provide this service to our members, perhaps through our web site. At last report, ProQuest is no longer offering this service except through libraries. Even a business with an actual library, Everton **Publishing** Company, seems to have been denied access to Heritage Questafter signing a contract! (See the web Everton site. www.everton.com for the There's continuing saga.) something wrong here! The whole point of providing information over the Internet is that you shouldn't have to leave home! You shouldn't have to go to a library just to use the computer, and your access to information services should not be limited by the decisions of your local library!

The real problem may be the lack of a clear financial model for information services, and perhaps a lack of adequate security software. ProQuest has to recover its operating costs, of course, but they also need to base fees they charge their customers on the actual operating costs those customers incur, so that they can support customers of all sizes. If they fail to do this, they will be overtaken by some other vendor who can offer the services we need at a fair price.

The Long Beach Public Library subscribes to Heritage Quest, but the library web site says you must come to the library to use it. ProQuest recently told one of our members that was not true, and so we will continue to try to get to the bottom of this story.





Volunteers are on hand and will gladly give you assistance. Regular hours for the Los Angeles FHC are Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, 10 am to 9 pm, and Friday and Saturday 9 am to 5 pm. The LA FHC is located on the grounds of the Los Angeles Temple, 10741 Santa Monica Blvd. in West Los Angeles; their phone number is (310) 474-9990. Their web page at http://www.lafhc.org provides details of their extensive collection. There are smaller FHCs locally, in Long Beach at 3701 Elm Avenue in Bixby Knolls, phone (562) 988-0509, in Los Alamitos, phone (714) 821-6914, and in Cerritos, phone (562) 924-3676. It is advisable to call ahead to the local centers, as their hours may change from time to time.
