# GENEALOGICAL RASPBERRY AWARD

There are so many new developments in electronic genealogy these days, it has become impossible to keep up! The rush is on to convert everything into digital format. We have been told that the Brigham Young University (BYU) library is adding about 100 titles per day to their collection of digitized family histories. These titles are now linked to the Family History Library catalogue. Even if the figure of 100 titles per day turns out to be exaggerated, there are many other projects in progress. For instance, the thousands of volunteers who brought you the FreeBMD project (indexing the British civil registration records beginning in 1837) have branched out and are now beginning to tackle the censuses and parish registers! The Massachusetts Archives has announced a new index to the Boston passenger lists, 1848-1891. And Ancestry.com has started adding images of the published vital records of Massachusetts, town by town, starting with A and now reaching the letter H. Since the Massachusetts vital records were published many decades ago, on paper that has often deteriorated badly, this is a most important contribution to our hobby.

However, not all these efforts have been successful. As we learned at our September meeting, the BYU project suffers from a poor indexing scheme that will only become worse as the collection grows. The search results are not organized by title, and you will get a hit even if the name happens to match an author's name! Worse, some of the search options seem not to work correctly. The problem of how to search an electronic version of a published genealogy is a very difficult one, still far from a general solution.

But I regret to inform our readers of the worst indexing blunder I have ever seen: the Massachusetts vital records project at Ancestry.com. These records are truly "vital." They are the mainstays of New England research, and they deserve to be completely indexed. It is a boon to researchers to have the digitized images available, and we are grateful for that. But does the index work?

I tested the indexes for five towns that were posted on Ancestry.com between July 27 and September 22. The towns were Bellingham, Chester, Deerfield, Essex, and Haverhill. I did a simple search: find the births for the surname "Smith." I was amazed that none of the indexes found the Smith births! I also looked at actual pages in the records of each town and then checked the names found there against the indexes. When the actual page contained births for the "Chase" family, for example, the index found no such records. In short, the indexes seem to have detected almost no names, and completely failed to notice the large surname headings that identify each section of the published records. Searching for a given name was no better; only two pages were identified as having the name "John" in all of Essex! It is my understanding that the indexes were created electronically, using "optical character recognition" (OCR). While OCR can be very accurate, it was clearly not so in this case! I searched for other explanations. Was the "index" only a list of "other persons mentioned"? No, there was no such index in the original volumes. Did the OCR program simply fail to understand which names were the surnames? No. If that had happened, there should have been hundreds of hits for the surname "John," but I found none.

Therefore, my pick for the Genealogical Raspberry Award, the most misleading and unhelpful innovation in genealogy for the entire year 2005, goes to Ancestry.com. Our members need to be aware that when they search Ancestry.com and do not find a name in the Massachusetts vital records, they have not actually searched those records.

As you may be aware, you can now purchase birth, marriage, and death certificates from the General Register Office (GRO) website using your credit card. You will be charged the equivalent amount in U.S. dollars. See their web site for additional information:

#### **INTERNET LOG**

An Ancestry.com Quick Tip submitted by Staff Writer, Elaine:

I create a Word document each month, saved as "Internet July 2005," "Internet August 2005," etc. When I'm ready to go online for research, I first open the current month's document and shrink it to the tool bar at the bottom of my screen. Then, as my internet search turns up information of possible interest, I highlight the data, copy, and save it on my monthly word document. Remember ALWAYS to note the source of the data in the word document! At my leisure, I print the monthly "gleanings" to determine what is useful and make appropriate entries in my genealogy files. We are often traveling in our motor home, away from a high speed internet link. During these times it is particularly nice to have a collection of materials stored away to work with.

#### SCGS WEBSITE UPDATES

<www.scgsgenealogy.com>

The complete Library Catalog of books, manuscripts and family histories has been added to the SCGS web site. The catalog holds information on over 30,000 genealogical reference items held in the library. The collection includes materials from every state in the U.S., as well as extensive special collections (e.g., French-Canadian, German, Hispanic, etc.).

If you live in the neighborhood, or are planning a trip to the library soon, use the catalog to organize your next visit from the comfort of home. Or if you're not able to visit the SCGS library in person, search online for materials that will help complete your family's history and request lookups from our Research Team for a nominal fee.

#### L.A. COUNTY ASSESSOR

At the County Assessor's web site you can find out where your ancestor lived and what is at that address now. If you enter a street name, you will see a list of all properties on that street, an intersection, a particular address or property ID number.

Some of the interesting pages will tell you the Property Tax ID (Assessor Identification Number), its location (street address), the age of the building on the lot, and even an exact "surveyor's map" (localized to the neighborhood) in addition to the general colored neighborhood map. Unfortunately, the L.A. Assessor's web site does NOT have photographs of each

property, as counties in some other states do.

If you can't find a particular street address, also check the USPS ZIP+4 website. If that site lists the address with a carrier route (but it can't be found on the County Assessor site) it may mean that an apartment building has a second entrance, only the "official one" being listed in the Assessor's site. Or maybe multiple houses on adjoining lots were replaced by a larger condominium or office building.

This site opens to a page containing a list of links to other sites.

One webpage contains a list of private books (county histories, lists of prominent people, etc.) or public resources with a list of people willing to do lookups (free or for a fee). One of the feebased researchers does L.A. City Directory lookups for \$3.00 per name—very reasonable, although there is no guarantee of results. If you think all public data should be freely available, stop to think about it. What county or state has spare money available in this tight economy to budget digitizing records or hiring staff to do free lookups?

Sometimes fee-based researchers charging modest fees (less than \$10.00) may just get you over a "brick wall" at no more cost than getting records through the state or county, usually with the same risks (i.e., upfront fee, no guarantee of success, and based solely on the spellings and information you provide).

Fee-based researchers are devoting their time to analyze or simply take your provided information and often have to pay for parking and transportation, photo or postage fees, which are passed on to you. Genealogy is an expensive hobby, if we all fully document our research from original records and personal field trips.

#### **RUTH ADELIA HAUGAN ANTHES**

Although we mentioned the passing of Ruth Anthes last month, we would like to reprint her entire obituary below. It was sent to us by her son John of Cedar Crest, New Mexico, at his mother's request. In his letter he said, "Mom indicated to me that her association with the Questing Heirs Genealogical Society was very energizing and helpful at conducting her own family history. She related how she was surprised and delighted to trace her ancestors back in time to qualify as a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution. And Mom discovered a Foote Family Arms going way back also on her Mother's side....She was 84 years young on July 11th."

From the Long Beach Press-Telegram of July 30, 2005...

"I knew this was going to happen and I am ready now. I'd like to thank my mother, father, and all my previous ancestors for good health and a rich long life." Ruth passed away peacefully on July 20, 2005 at home in Cerritos, CA. She was born July 11, 1921 in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Ruth graduated from Oshkosh HS in 1939 and received a BS in elementary teaching from the University of Wisconsin, Oshkosh in 1946. She married Jacob Anthes in June 1946 and subsequently raised a loving family of five children. Ruth moved to California in 1964 and has been a resident in Cerritos since 1971. She is survived by children, John in Cedar Crest, NM, Richard in Redding, CA, Susan in Colorado Spring, CO, Thomas, in Greenwich, RI, James in Cerritos, CA; and four grandchildren, Jason, Julie Sumner, Sarah Harpst, and Rachael. Ruth taught in the Long Beach Early Education program at numerous schools, retiring with 16 years of rewarding memories with her "extended" family in 1987. She was an active participant in the Lakewood Senior Citizens Club where she was known as the "Sunshine Lady." Ruth was a 61 year lifetime member of the Order of Eastern Star, the Daughters of the American Revolution, and the Sons of Norway. Services will be held Saturday, July 30<sup>th</sup>, 2 PM, at Miller-Mies Mortuary 11015 Downey Ave., Downey, CA 90241."



Volunteers are on hand and will gladly give you assistance. Regular hours for the Los Angeles Regional FHC are Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, 10 am to 9 pm, and Friday and Saturday 9 am to 5 pm. The LARFHC is located on the grounds of the Los Angeles Temple, 10741 Santa Monica Blvd. in West Los Angeles; their phone number is (310) 474-9990. Their web page at <a href="http://www.lafhc.org">http://www.lafhc.org</a> provides details of their extensive collection.
