

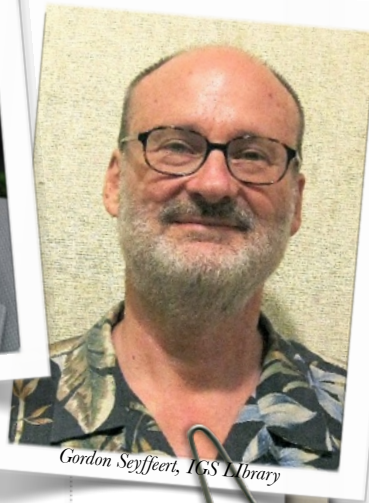

## MEETING AGENDA

**APRIL 19, 2015**

**Starting at 1:00 p.m., Gordon Seyffert** will talk about German research. He will also describe the genealogical reference books, maps and resources available at the Immigrant Genealogical Society’s library in Burbank. After our break, **at 2:30 p.m., Dr. Eric Siess, Ph.D., CG.** will present “Swedes and Other Scandinavians Came To and Through the ‘States,” a talk focusing on one of his specialties: Swedish research. If you have Swedish, Norwegian, Finnish or Danish ancestors, you will want to hear Dr. Siess tell us how to find Scandinavian immigrant arrivals in the U.S. and how to trace those immigrants when they migrate to various states.

### GORDON SEYFFERT

Gordon writes: “I am the editor of the newsletter of the Immigrant Genealogical Society. My primary interest is German genealogy, based largely on my reading of church books on microfilm, monitoring of German/English digests focused on selected regions of Germany, and use of a wide range of websites in both Germany and the US. I am not a professional, nor am I an expert. I read some German, and do translations for my own use, but am not fluent by any means. I have found

that great progress can be made by merely refusing to be intimidated by problems of language and culture, and I feel it is my “mission” in life to show others that they can do the same. Nothing ventured, nothing gained!”

Dr. Siess is a Certified Genealogist and the President of South Bay Cities Genealogical Society. Eric taught beginning and intermediate genealogy at the South Bay Adult school for several years, and one of his courses, “Solving the Ultimate Puzzle: Family History,” was the 2011 LiveWell class for Intellectual Health. He is a frequent lecturer at genealogy clubs in Southern California and taught a class, “Follow the Path to the Old Country with Emigration Records and the GPS,” at Jamboree in 2013. He will be giving a lecture, “Ten Steps to Better Genealogy,” for the popular SCGS webinar series in October of this year.

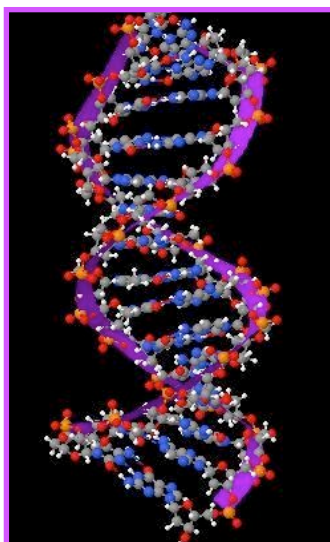
## Genetic Genealogy Online

This month your newsletter editor is going to spotlight blogs and websites that present DNA as a tool for genealogical research.

Let's start with **CeCe Moore's** informative blog, "**Your Genetic Genealogist**," at <http://www.yourgeneticgenealogist.com/>. If you've ever wondered, "Will taking a DNA test help me untangle some stubborn knots in my genealogy research?" be sure to read the lead article on CeCe's homepage, [Switched at Birth: Unraveling a Century-Old Mystery with DNA](#), written by Alice Plebuch. What a fascinating story!

Complex problems like this one can only be solved by using DNA matches. After you've read this article, be sure to click on the "Resources" button at the top of the page. CeCe has a selection of mailing lists and forums you can join, followed by a four-part series of articles on the basics of DNA testing for genealogy. You can view videos, listen to podcasts, and watch episodes of "Finding Your Roots with Henry Louis Gates, Jr." CeCe also provides links to other DNA blogs and helpful websites, and she takes you behind the scenes of "Finding Your Roots" with "DNA 101: The Secrets in the Science." If that isn't enough, her series, "DNA Comparisons from Known Relationships," has fourteen different articles explaining how DNA has helped her find matches.

**Judy G. Russell, JD, CG, CGL**, "**The Legal Genealogist**," writes an interesting blog at <http://www.legalgenealogist.com/>. Every Sunday Judy posts an article about using DNA for genealogical research—that's 52 articles a year! Find them all by typing "DNA" into the search box in the upper right-hand corner of her homepage and hitting your enter/return key. Judy puts a great deal of thought into these posts, and all of them are informative. If you have been wondering about the legal implications of DNA testing or how to credit DNA sources in your personal family tree, Judy is the woman to read.



If you are new to genetic genealogy and don't know which website offers the "best" information; if you are "ready to test" but don't know which company to test with; or, in short, if you don't know where or how to begin, start by using the **FamilySearch WIKI** at [http://familysearch.org/learn/wiki/en/Hiring\\_a\\_DNA\\_Testing\\_Company](http://familysearch.org/learn/wiki/en/Hiring_a_DNA_Testing_Company). The FamilySearch WIKI is a great resource that's good for more than finding city, county, state and country resources online. It can connect you to lots of information. Plug in a subject like "DNA," and the WIKI will link you to everything you always wanted to know about genetic genealogy from

adoption research to blood groups in Eastern Europe. Try some WIKI links right now!
